MOSAIC, the INTERNET and CIM

You have probably heard about the World Wide Web (written www, W3 or Web for short) or at least about Mosaic. If you have not yet encountered the Web, the best way to do so is by activating mosaic from your X terminal (this can be done by typing "mosaic &" from your xterm window).

Mosaic is a user-friendly, graphical interface that allows you to access the many resources on the Internet. You can download music and videos, for instance, with a click of a button. It will even play them on your machine once it's downloaded.

We are currently working on organizing the CIM information pages for the Web. We would like to create a "home page" for all the members of CIM. The information provided will be exactly the same as in the CIM Phone Directory, i.e. name, username, room & phone number, supervisor & degree; some of which is already available on the Web through the McGill pages. However, you will have the opportunity to provide other information about yourself should you so desire (eg, current research topics, interests, a picture of yourself, etc) for other folks who are browsing our W3 pages. If you want to include a picture of yourself on your home page we have decided to help by having a "picture gathering drive". To have your picture added to our archives, you can do one of the following:

- 1) Submit a picture of yourself to Kathleen in MC410. We will then scan them and convert them to the appropriate electronic format.
- 2) Come to see us during one of the following times and we can take a photo of you.

- 3) Or, if you prefer, you can create a picture of yourself (.gif format, recommended dimensions 160x160). Be sure to:
- a) name it <your_login_name.gif>
- b) create a directory ~/public_html/ for it
- c) place it in the above mentioned directory and make sure it is "world readable" (ie, chmod a+r).

What IF disaster struck?

A question more often than not ignored; until it's too late. Yet the daily news abound in natural and provoked disasters. Here at McGill, a fire ravaged the Lady Meredith House several years ago thus destroying the entire contents of the building. Subsequently, an Internal Audit Report on Contingency Planning in the Computer Center and ISR has recommended that a comprehensive risk analysis be carried out for ALL the different segments of McGill's operations. In other words we are all being asked the question: what should we do and how would we continue to operate in the event of a fire, a flood or civil unrest?

As we at CIM discovered in January of 94, even on the fourth floor the Centre is not immune to floods. We were lucky in that equipment damage was minimal and that records which were damaged were not lost. But the question arises: what *if* a water pipe burst in one of the labs or if a fire broke out in one of the offices? Prevention, of course, is the number one objective but today it is also necessary to draw up a contingency plan in case of a breakdown. CIM relies heavily on computers. If the computers are destroyed can the Centre continue to function?

To fulfill the University's request on this issue, our Safety Committee is being asked to make an inventory of the Centre and to draw up some ideas for our own contingency plan. The committee will be asked to deal with the following questions: What impact would a disaster have on the Centre? How can we minimize the risks? Who should be called to deal with emergencies and what procedure should be followed depending on the type of emergency? This Committee is composed of Martin Buehler, Hannah Michalska, Janet Burghardt, Jan Binder and student volunteers. 
Third CIM seminar

Prof. Sue Whitesides sends greetings from the south of France, where she is spending a sabbatical at INRIA Sophia-Antipolis, working with the computational geometry group in Projet Prisme. While on sabbatical, she has decided to resign from CIM in order to focus on her primary involvement with the computational geometry group in the School of Computer Science. However, she looks forward to continued interaction with CIM students and faculty upon her return to McGill in September 1995.

Prof. Laeeque Daneshmend has informed us that he has been offered, and has accepted, the Noranda-Falconbridge endowed Chair in Mine Mechanical Engineering at Queen's University effective this spring. He explained that this is a joint appointment in the Mining and Mechanical departments (75%:25%), and is ideally matched to his teaching and research interests. Queen's, he says, has a unique undergraduate program in Mine Mechanical engineering, where the students take about 2/3 of the regular courses from the mechanical curriculum, with the remainder in Mining - giving them a good grasp of Mining operations while building a solid technical base they can apply equipment to maintenance/selection/design as well as mechanization and automation. The Mine Mechanical program at Queen's has elicited widespread support from the Canadian mining industry. This is evident from the funding of the Mine Mechanical chair, which received contributions from a dozen other mining companies in addition to Noranda and Falconbridge.
